






The next part of our trip began up the road in Leadville where we met up with Doug, Laurie, Garrett and Blake at the Delaware Hotel on 13July2017.




Doug was wise and located the Picasso pictograph. Searching began in earnest along creeks, in caves and under ledges, etc.






The next morning we packed up and continued to explore the area. There's a lot to look at around Echo Park.

There was a cave that as soon as you stepped into it, the temperature dropped at least 20 degrees.











So after some final looks around and some stone gazing, we started the drive out of Echo Park.


















The next destination was the Red Canyon Lodge in Utah where Laurie had made reservations. We had dinner at the lodge where hummingbirds were hanging out.







The search party returned after exploring down-river and up a dry creek from the park. We then proceeded to Vermillion Falls.

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
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


We poked around

town.


